- **When Parks and Road Projects Intersect:** An overview of Section 4f guidelines and examples of how to deal with parks, trails, and recreational areas impacted by road projects.
- **Threatened and Endangered Species Review Extravaganza:** Overview of the Endangered Species Act, updates on using the IPaC determination keys, summary of how to link project work types to an effect analysis plus updates on species status changes and the LAP flowchart and what that will mean for consultation.
- **Section 106 Updates:** Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act requires agencies to consider potential effects of actions that involve federal funding on historic properties, such as buildings and archaeological sites. A new Programmatic Agreement is in process to streamline the Section 106 process and will for the first time cover federally-funded local agency projects. You will learn some background about historic properties, find out what a Programmatic Agreement is, and hear an overview of coming changes.
